

## **Scam Aware**

Every year millions of people across the UK fall prey to scammers. However, it remains largely unreported, and its consequences can be devastating.

It can affect anyone but, most often, it is the elderly, isolated and vulnerable who fall victim.

There are many different types of scams in existence for example:

- Postal Scams Postal Scams come in many forms and attempt to extract personal details, financial information or money.
- **Telephone Scams** Communication by telephone is a very effective and easy method by which criminals can obtain personal details or financial information. Examples are too good to be true offers, computer fix calls
- Online Scams Criminals trick internet and email users into giving personal details, including financial information, in order to steal their money. Examples are emails and impersonation
- Doorstep Scams Criminals use a variety of door step tactics to make victims part with their money or gain entry to their homes for distraction burglary or as a rogue trader
